Focus on the Holy Land

One of the primary missions of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius is to support the people and structures of the Holy Land.

The international body of the Royal Confraternity has been supporting the Monastery of Saint Catherine of Alexandria in Bethlehem for many years in partnership with the Franciscans. This program is funded principally through the Bethlehem Medal. Members of the Royal Confraternity who contribute a minimum of 200 euros to the account of the Monastery in the Holy Land earn a beautiful commemorative medal to remember their act of kindness and generosity. We donated 700 euros this year.



Many of our members have also made other forms of donations to projects in the Holy Land in the name of RCST or as an individual member.

Leading up to the investiture service in Carlisle, Pennsylvania this year we held a campaign to encourage the members of the General Priory of the USA to participate in the Bethlehem Medal program. After the event we will plan a visit to the Holy Land to deliver the contributions and review and assess our efforts thus far.

We will also be making a contribution to the refugee project of the Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem through the General Priory of the USA. This year the majority of the proceeds of our fund raising event are dedicated to the Latin Patriarchate although we did make several additional donations to causes of Ethiopia and Tibet.

I would also encourage all of our members to remember our brethren in the Holy Land in their prayers. The courage required to remain as a Christian in the Holy Land today is truly remarkable and extraordinary.

The Heads of the Royal House of Georgia, claimed descendants of the House of David, have been the Royal Patrons of the Confraternity for two generations.

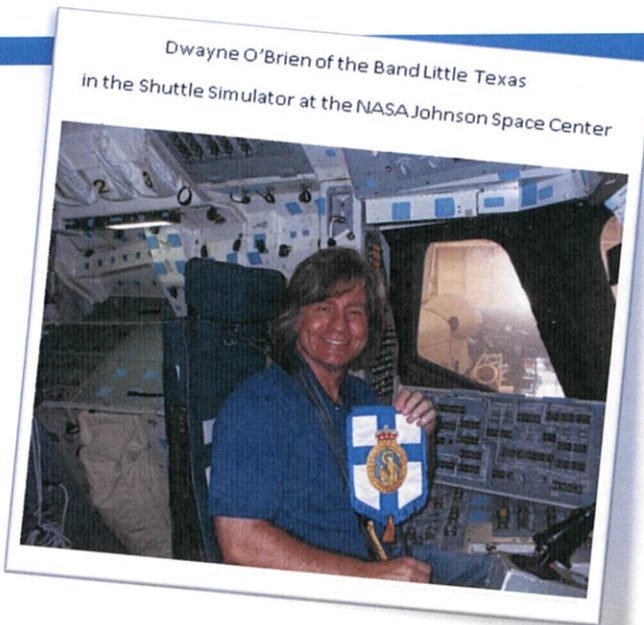
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To the Ends of the Earth

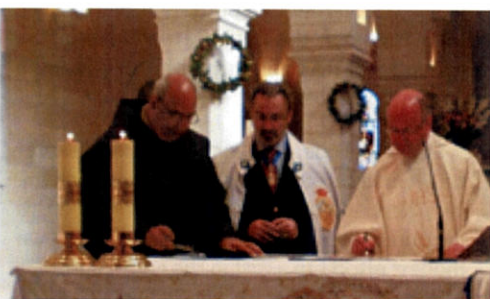
What is a Confraternity?

Today, the term Confraternity can be used to describe many types of organizations. The general definition being that a Confraternity is composed of members who share the same interests and goals. Indeed many are familiar with strictly religious Confraternities which may be dedicated to prayer and good works according to a specific rule. Others may take the form of guilds. This sometimes gives the impression that it is improper for the members of a Confraternity to be styled as Knights and Dames. This is simply not correct. When we think of Knights and Dames we most usually conjure images of either the great Orders of Chivalry or the Knights Bachelor. The former were Knights bound under a rule serving either the Crown or the Church. The latter was a man elevated to the rank of Knight by the Monarch. There was, however, a third and more popular form of Knighthood which was particularly prolific in the medieval period. This was the Confraternity. Groups of Knights gathered together under a Noble or Prince to establish a company dedicated to a specific Saint or cause to which they dedicated their work and lives.

Grand Prior in the Holy Land

A historic agreement between the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius and the Franciscans signed in the Holy Land.



It is into this last category that the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius falls. It is called "royal" because it was formed by a Royal Prince, 4th in line to the throne of Portugal together with the then Bishop of São Tomé & Príncipe. The purpose is to remember the life and works of Saint Theotonius, and in the process stand as defenders of Christianity and those in need. Subsequent to the establishment of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius, it was granted Royal Patronage by the Royal House of Georgia. Currently, the Royal Confraternity enjoys the Royal Patronage of the House of Georgia in the second generation. The members of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius, called Brother Knights and Sister Dames, are recognized by the Head of the Royal House of Georgia as such and the many royals who

are also members of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius consider their own Knighthoods valid.

The Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius is therefore a worldwide organization composed of knights and dames who are dedicated to the defense of Christianity and those who cannot defend themselves, and the remembrance of the life and works of Saint Theotonius.

The Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius embraces the ceremonies and traditions associated with this historic form of knighthood including traditional offices like Herald as well as regalia such as mantles, insignia, rosettes, etc. The Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius also has its own distinctive flag, banners, pipe banners, and other traditional display and ceremonial items. Members are admitted in a solemn ceremony of Investiture involving a traditional sword and which is accompanied by a religious service presided over by the Grand Prior.

Several years ago I had the distinct privilege of meeting the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, His Beatitude Fouad Twal at an event in Maryland. The Patriarch reminded me of Saint Pope John Paul II. He was extraordinarily personable and spoke with a passion about the Christian community of the Holy Land. Obviously this was a topic close to his heart as in addition to his responsibility over the Latin Patriarchate, His Beatitude is himself a member of the Christian community native to the Holy Land.

Over the years I have noted the courageous voice of the Patriarch in regard to matters of the Middle East. He is a role model for all Christians and we are fortunate that such a man holds this critical position of custody over the Holiest sites of Christianity.

This year I have had several communications from His Beatitude in which we discussed the works of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius in the Holy Land and our possible future contributions. The Patriarch has thanked us for our modest efforts to assist with projects in the Middle

East and in particular our partnership with the Franciscans at the Monastery of Saint Catherine of Alexandria in Bethlehem. He is very appreciative of our ongoing efforts and our commitment to remain involved in providing assistance to the Latin Patriarchate in the Holy Land.

At my request, to provide encouragement to our membership in this important mission, His Beatitude has provided a photo and his blessing upon all of us. An image of the photo and message appears at the top of this page along with an image of the Arms of the Latin Patriarchate. In the words of His Beatitude, "I enclose a photograph that you requested and extend to you and your members my benediction and best wishes".

The Patriarch had earlier drawn my attention to the website of the Latin Patriarchate which contains a section with overviews of projects that the Latin Patriarchate would most like to see implemented in the Holy Lands under its jurisdiction. His Beatitude has several times stressed the importance of these projects to

me and I would like to see the General Priory of the USA target one of these projects. I will follow up with the Latin Patriarchate in the coming months to determine if this is feasible for our Confraternity.

His Beatitude is scheduled to retire later this year. If this comes to pass we wish him the very best and we will remain grateful for his encouragement and guidance in our own modest efforts to assist in the Holy Land.

His Beatitude was born in Madaba in the Kingdom of Jordan and has been the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem and Grand Prior of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem since 2008.

The Sultan is a staunch supporter of the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius and he is frequently in attendance at events of our organization.

I am pleased to announce that His Highness was among those dignitaries who consented to attend our scheduled investiture event in October of 2016 in Gettysburg and Carlisle, Pennsylvania. This marked the first occasion that the Sultan traveled to the USA for an event of the Confraternity and we had a wonderful time visiting with His Highness in the General Priory.

The Sultan will also be visiting our brethren in the General Priory of Canada later this year. He is a member of our Confraternity and not just a guest dignitary. Today the Sultan resides in France.

The ancestral nation of the Sultan is the Comoro Islands, which lie off the southeast coast of Africa. Grande Comore, also known as Ngazidja, is the largest of the islands and contains the capital.

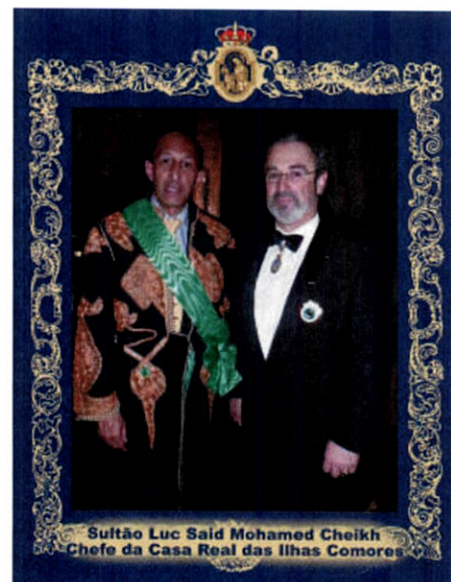
The country contains many interesting and unique animals including a species of bat discovered by the explorer David Livingstone in 1863.

The Comoro Islands have a rich history including contact with Europeans beginning with the Portuguese in 1505 and the French in 1529. Islam is said to have arrived in the islands in the 10th century. The islands were key in the trade routes with India throughout the centuries.

French influence continued through the establishment of colonial rule on Mayotte in 1841 and the establishment of a protectorate over Grande Comore in 1886. Today, Mayotte remains an overseas dependency of France although the rest of the islands belong to the sovereign nation of the Union of the Comoros.

The Comoro Islands are a member state of the United Nations. The population is under 800,000. The country has three official languages which are; Comorian, Arabic, and French.

Currently it is a republic with free and democratic elections. It is an exotic and interesting land with a unique and blended culture. We are fortunate to have the Sultan represent this culture in our Confraternity.



The Royal House of Georgia



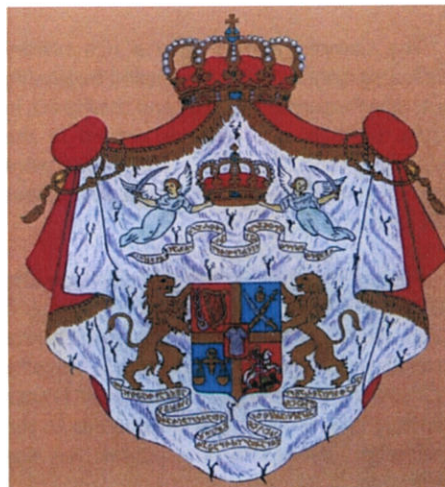
On the date 17th of December 2007, H.R.H. Prince George de Bagration of Mukhrany, Head of the Royal Family of Bagration (Georgia), Pretender to the Throne of Georgia and Grandmaster of the Order of the Tunic of Our Lord became the Royal Patron of the RCST in perpetuity and provided the Patronage of the Royal House of Georgia to the Confraternity. It is with great regret that H.R.H. Prince George Bagration was called to be with our Lord on the 16th of January 2008. H.R.H. was succeeded as Patron of the Confraternity by his heir and successor H.R.H. Davit Bagrationi Mukhran Batonishvili, Prince of Mukhrani, Prince of Kartli, Prince of Georgia, Duke of Lasos, Pretender to the throne of Georgia, Head of the Family Council of the Royal House of Georgia, Sovereign Head and Grand Master of the Order of the Eagle of Georgia and the Seamless Tunic of Our Lord Jesus Christ, Grand Master of the Order of the Holy Queen Tamara, and Sovereign Head of the Council of the Medal of Merit

The Bagrationis are the oldest royal dynasty in Europe. They have been kings since the 6th century, and "kings of the Kartvels" (Georgians) since the 9th century. As members of the branch of the Parnavazians, their documented history began in the fourth century B.C. Tradition has it that the Bagrationi family is descendant from David, King of Jews and their power established by God. According to the historical record, the Bagrationi family came from the ancient historical-geographic province of Speri (now Ispiri, in Turkey). At some point before the 5th century, a branch of the Bagrationi family settled in what is currently Georgia, while another settled in Armenia and another in Hereti. Members of this family came to power in all the areas they settled in and governed Georgia for centuries.

The Georgian Bagrationis came into power in the middle of the sixth century when the ersitavis (rulers) of Kartli elected them from among their circle as leaders, out of "fear" of the Persian and Byzantine conquerors. The current Bagrationi dynasty ruled in Georgia from the early ninth century to the beginning of the 19th century, thus ruling for a period of more than ten centuries. During this time, the most notable members of the Bagrationi family were Davit IV "the Builder" (1089-1125) and Saint Queen Tamar 1179-1213). These were times in which the Georgian state reached the peak of its splendor and power.

Georgia lost its independence in the 19th century, and the Bagrationis suffered the severest of repressions. Nearly all of them had to go into exile in Russia while others to other countries. The members of the royal Georgian family found refuge in science and the arts. The King was the common bond that united them all as the symbol of stability, belief in the future and faith. The Russian power structure knew that very well and, after Georgia was annexed, the royal family of Bagrationi had to exile themselves from the country.

In 1995, H.R.H. Prince Giorgi Bagrationi transferred the bodies of his grandparents – TRH Giorgi Bagration and Helena Sigismundovna (née Nowina Złotnicka) – to Georgia, accompanied by his aunt and his cousin the Grand Duchesses Leonida Georgiyevna Romanova and Maria Vladimirovna as well as by his nephew Czarevitch George. They were buried in the Cathedral of Svetitskhoveli and the funeral was officiated with state honors by HH Patriarch Catholicos Ilia II. On that occasion, when President Eduard Shevardnadze received



H.R.H. Prince Giorgi Bagrationi, he said to him, "My Lord, you are in your home. We need the Royal Family for the unity of the country."

H.R.H. Prince Giorgi Bagrationi was recognized as the Head of the Royal House and heir to the Crown of Georgia, ratified in Georgia by the three first presidents to serve the nation since its independence from the Soviet Union. It was President Mikhail Saakashvili who made the royal family's Georgian citizenship official, providing them with Georgian passports and identity cards and conceding them the status of royalty on both documents.

On November 15, 2007 – during the lifetime of H.R.H. Prince Giorgi – His Holiness and Beatitude Patriarch Catholicos Ilia II made a pronouncement in favor of restoring the monarchy in Georgia. In 2005, H.R.H. Prince Giorgi Bagrationi settled in Tbilisi, where he resided as the rightful King Giorgi XIII until his death on January 16, 2008. Despite two hundred years of Russian occupation, the royal status of the Bagrationi dynasty has never been called into question in Georgia.

Upon the death of H.R.H. Prince Giorgi and according to his wishes, he was succeeded in the Grand Mastership by his third-born son, H.R.H. Prince Davit, following the Georgian tradition of succession, in which the monarch or Head of the Royal House designates the most suitable choice from among his sons.

Charitable and Humanitarian Programs and Projects of the RCST



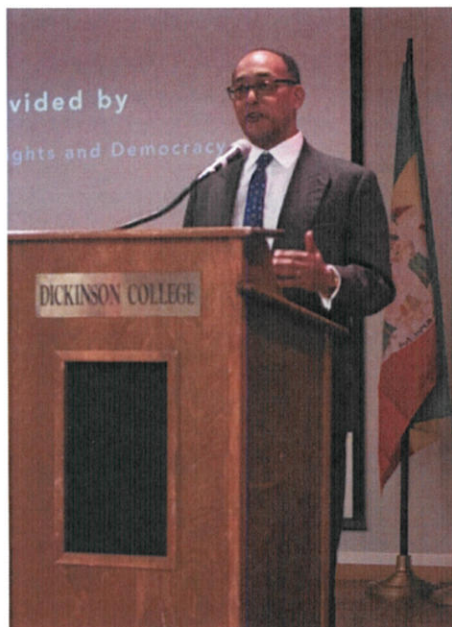
On July 30th, a medical supply package (valued at approximately \$14,000 U.S.) was prepared by a partnership of the Association and the Royal Confraternity of Saint Teotônio (under the patronage of H.R.H. Dom Miguel de Bragança, Duke of Viseu). This package, which consists of 25 electrocautery devices for surgery, an epidural anesthesia tray, three dual lumen central line catheters, 8 Hickman introducers, 35 vacutainers for blood draws, 36 IV peripheral line catheters with introducer needle (starter kit), eight low-temp disposable cautery devices for emergency room/clinic use, two surgical needle drivers for suturing, two large tissue forceps for suturing, 19 packages of suture (all grades), 25 surgical grade electrocautery devices for operating room use (boxed separately), three surgical staplers, three endocath introducers for laparoscopy, a roto-auto suture device, and eight large boxes of suture material including one box of gore-tex suture, has been donated by the Association and Royal Confraternity to assist the needs of the people of the Republic of São Tomé y Príncipe. An additional shipment of humanitarian materials from this partnership will also be sent in the next few months, and we will report more at that time.

To this end, the Association is exceedingly grateful of the efforts of Chevalier Dr. Andrew J. Schoenfeld, GCLR, FICS, MD for his contributions and work in this endeavor.



The General Priory of the USA

2016 Convent and Investiture



The General Priory of the USA was host to a large number of dignitaries during the 2016 event in the towns of Carlisle and Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. We were privileged to have HH Prince Ermias Sahle-Selassie Haile-Selassie and his wife HH Princess Saba Kebede join us yet again. HH Luc Said Mohamed Cheikh, Sultan of the Comoros Islands was also present. Visiting with us for the first time were HRH Prince Balthazar of Bourbon-Bhopal and his sons Prince Frederick and Prince Adrian, all of whom were invested into the Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius. The Royal House of Bourbon-Bhopal originated with a member of the noble French House of Bourbon (later Royal in France) who journeyed to India and found himself in service of the Mughal Emperor who rewarded him with a small Principality which was later briefly sovereign and from which they derive their royal status. We were also joined by very special guest HM Lhagyari Trichen Namgyal Wangchuk, King of Tibet. He was crowned as such in a formal ceremony by the present Dalai Lama when the King was but 14 years old. His Majesty graced our Confraternity by accepting our Grand Collar. Last but not least we were joined by HH Prince Paul Gulgowski-Doliwa, Duke of Schlesien-Glogau and his wife Princess Heide.

The event began with a tour of Gettysburg Battlefield in a shuttle bus on the 21st of

October, specially decorated with large car magnets featuring the crowned logo of our Confraternity. The tour was conducted by the Baron of Adama and followed the progression of the epic battle of the course of three days in July of 1863. There were stops at key sites and ample time for the guests to ask questions and have breakout discussions as we all improved our understanding of this crucial part of American history.

After the tour our guests and members returned in time to prepare for an evening reception held at the historic Gettysburg Hotel.



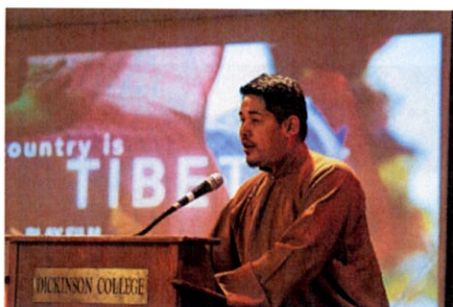
An Investiture was held at the First United Church of Christ in Carlisle on the 22nd of October including the admission of Master Max Hardman as Squire to the Grand Prior. In this historic ceremony, four members of royal houses were admitted to our Confraternity through the General Priory of the USA. Nearly twenty others were admitted or promoted at this time.

The Investiture Service was followed by a wonderful banquet at the Comfort Suites in Carlisle that evening. The Marquis of Casavecchio orchestrated a marvelous presentation including beautiful tapestries and stonework from his museum meant to

celebrate and commemorate the various royal houses in attendance. The tapestries included the feature work replicating and embellishing a design from 1668 of an Ethiopian Imperial Arms dedicated to the late Emperor, HM Haile Selassie I, grandfather of HH Prince Ermias Sahle-Selassie Haile-Selassie. We were also privileged to witness the official presentation of a USCG Commendation Medal presented to Dr. Gregg Hardman, one of our members, for saving a life.



Additional plans for fundraising activities and our next event were discussed and proposed. We have selected the site of our next event to be New Orleans, Louisiana in the year 2018. We have also approved a new Commemorative Medal honoring Tibetans who have given their lives for the cause of freedom in their country. The proceeds of this medal will benefit a monument to be built in India for the same purpose. This will be an ongoing project in which all members of the RCST can participate by purchasing the medal and supporting the effort. Details and availability will follow.



The 23rd of October was reserved for a Symposium on Interfaith Matters hosted by the Confraternity at Dickinson College in Carlisle. Speakers and presenters included HM the King of Tibet, who shared his extraordinary film "My Country is Tibet" with us. It is the story of the life of His Majesty and that of the Tibetan people in exile. It was a very profound and moving experience for all who were fortunate enough to view the film and to participate in the question and answer period which followed a brief speech by the King. His Majesty was followed by HH Prince Ermias Sahle-Selassie Haile-Selassie, President of the Crown Council of Ethiopia who spoke about his country. His Imperial Highness pointed out some striking parallels between the two royal houses with regard to their treatment and experience following the displacement of their respective dynasties. It was an extraordinary experience to hear these accounts directly from the men who had these experiences.



The Sultan of Grand Comore shared his own experiences with the audience as well. The Sultan had a very different life experience for himself and his dynasty, but gave a very interesting presentation covering the history of his country, his dynasty, and his very interesting personal flag, whose symbolism was explained. It was a very interesting overview of this most interesting nation.

Our own Bishop Sloane shared his thoughts and comments with the audience in addition to taking the part of the moderator.



It was an interesting and informative event. As General Prior for the USA, I included some closing remarks after which the group adjourned to a local Thai Restaurant in Carlisle which was specially opened for our members and guests by the proprietor. And with the completion of our visit to the Thai Restaurant so too concluded our program for 2016. It was an enjoyable event by all measures.



The next event of the General Priory of the USA has been tentatively set for 2018 in New Orleans, Louisiana. The object of the fundraising for this event has been designated as Tibet.

HM the King has proposed a memorial to those who have lost or given their lives in the cause of a free Tibet. The memorial will be constructed in India and bear the names of those who have given their lives.

A special commemorative medal has been approved to help raise funds for this special project. The design is to feature the Arms of the Royal Confraternity, the Tibetan flag, the

signature of the King, and a motto recognizing the people of Tibet. It will follow the structure of the Holy Land Medal and when available will be sold to the membership with proceeds benefitting the creation of the permanent memorial in India.





Our Namesake: Saint Theotonius

Saint Theotonius was born in the village of Ganfei, in northern Portugal around 1082. His parents, Oveco (James) and Eugenia were both wealthy and pious. He was called "Theotonius", a Greek name meaning 'godly'. His uncle Dom Crescónio, Abbot of the Benedictine monastery near Tuy, was his first teacher. When Dom Crescónio became Bishop of Coimbra in 1092, he brought the ten-year-old Theotonius with him. After the death of Bishop Crescónio in 1098, Theotonius went to Viseu, where his uncle named Teodorico was Prior of the Cathedral Chapter of Sancta Maria. During his time of preparation for the priesthood, Theotonius progressed through the minor ecclesiastic orders with great diligence and piety.

After being ordained a priest, he remained at Viseu, where his service was so well-received that he soon was given the charge of the entire township as archpriest. He resigned so he could make a journey to the Holy Land, and upon his return, resumed ministering in Viseu. He was both an excellent speaker and an advocate for the poor. Theotonius was asked a many times by Count Henry and Queen Teresa, to assume the office of bishop.

Theotonius left his parish with a large number of pilgrims and set out once more to Jerusalem. After travelling for ten weeks, the group arrived at the port of Saint Nicholas, where they waited six weeks for favorable winds. As they were sailing by the Cape of Malea, they found themselves in a storm. Three weeks after leaving Bari, they arrived at the port of Joppa. The pilgrims started at the tomb of Saint George, in Lydda. From there they went to Nazareth, Mount Tabor, and Samaria, and saw the tomb of St. John the Baptist. Upon entering the Jerusalem, Theotonius set himself first to see the Cross on Mount Calvary. He also visited the Mount of Olives and to Bethany. Travelling to Bethlehem, the group continued



on to Capharnaum, and the Sea of Galilee. There the pilgrimage ended, and Theotonius and the other pilgrims from his parish returned to Portugal. Theotonius' experience in Holy Land resulted in both an increased devotion to the Passion and an intention to found a religious order following the Augustinian Rule.

Theotonius was a trusted advisor of Portugal's first king, Afonso Henriques (ruled 1139-85). The king attributed his success at the Battle of Ourique to the prayers of Theotonius, who was thus able to persuade the king to release Mozarabic Christians

captured during forays into land held by the Moors.

Although his counsel was sought by Afonso Henriques, Theotonius did not hesitate to reprove the king or queen if he thought them in the wrong. One day, in the church of Viseu, he preached a sermon against co-habitation in the presence of the widowed queen and her lover, Count Fernando. On another occasion when the queen told him to shorten the Mass, he replied that the Mass is offered for a sovereign greater than she. Therefore she could stay or go, but the length of the Mass would remain unchanged. He was offered the bishopric of Viseu and later Coimbra, but declined, partly because he suspected the queen was attempting to bribe him.

Theotonius retired from his pastoral office of prior, after 30 years of service. He then became a hermit in solitude. He kept with him through his old age a shepherd's staff which St. Bernard, the abbot of Clairvaux, had sent to him as a present when he heard of his sanctity. On Saturday, 18 February 1166, Theotonius died. The entire city of Coimbra showed their admiration for him. King Afonso I of Portugal was taken by such grief that he

said of him, "His soul will be in Heaven before his body is in the tomb". During his life, St. Theotonius was known for his humility and piety. His cultus was approved by Benedict XIV. His feast day is February 18.

The Royal Confraternity of Saint Theotonius, founded the 2nd of November 2000, under the Royal Protection of Dom Miguel de Bragança, Duke of Viseu, Infante of Portugal, is a secular organization of the faithful with common ends, a group of men willingly desiring to defend the origins and Christian values, maintain and honor the spirit of and remember and promote devotion to Saint Theotonius.
